UPDATE ON CITY PROJECTS

The T Highway Widening project is continuing. This is a Cost Share Project with the City and MoDOT and was approved nearly two years ago by the City Council to address traffic flow issues along Route 66 and at the T Highway junction. The project will include a three lane road from Ichord Ave. to T Highway and a roundabout, or traffic circle, at T Highway. It will have space for sidewalks in the future. Resurfacing from the I Bank to Buckhorn is included in this project, also.

MoDOT is in the process of acquiring easements, designing and putting together a plan for moving several of our utilities along Route 66. MoDOT District Engineer, Preston Kramer, tells us that bids will be let in April of 2016. He also says that traffic will always have access to that intersection and that the major work will take place next summer when school is not in session and the target date for completion is the fall of 2016.

The City is in the process of acquiring three dilapidated houses on Pine Street and plan to take them down for green space. We have also begun taking down the metal buildings near the RV Park that housed the Street Department for years. Pictured here is the removal of a dilapidated house on Hope Street that will become the site of a new Habitat for Humanity home.



The new City Hall continues to make progress, as three departments have moved in and are doing business there. We expect to see completion in 2016.

PULASKI MAKES A NAME FOR HIMSELF

Count Casimir Pulaski has his name on numerous ships, forts, cities, counties, buildings. He was a Polish nobleman, born in 1745, who selflessly emigrated to America to help in the American Revolution. Known as the "father of the American cavalry", Pulaski famously said, "I came here, where freedom is being defended, to serve it and to live or die for it." As a general in the Continental Army, he saved the life of General Washington and created the American cavalry.

Pulaski was at Valley Forge and was wounded at the Battle of Savannah in 1779. He could barely speak English and this caused some issues with his leadership. He and the Marquis de Lafayette were good friends and Lafayette laid the cornerstone on his Savannah monument.

Pulaski is one of only seven people to be given honorary citizenship in America. We are honored to be Pulaski County.
