YEAR IN REVIEW FOR 2015

2015 was an eventful year for the City of Waynesville. We were saddened in March by the unexpected death of long time Councilwoman, Diana Stanford.

The City welcomed hundreds of visitors to the National Speleological Society in July. In the fall, the Czech Route 66 group and the Kelly Miller Circus stopped by.

After the flood of 2013, the Council determined to mitigate many of the issues that were problems for many years. This year we have removed the Roubidoux Lift Station from the creek bed of the Roubidoux, moved the Kiwanis Baseball Fields to higher ground, relocated our Street Department to the new City Hall and purchased a mobile RV shower house. We are removing the old street buildings and creating pavilions there to allow the Farmer's Market to have a permanent home. With ample parking and bathroom facilities, it will be a visible location for the Market.



The City continues to focus on cleaning out Mitchell Creek, removing over 320 tons of debris from the creek bed, and in 2016, we will install a gravel trap near Tiger Bridge to stop debris and gravel from collecting there.

A highlight of the year was the dedication by the National Park Service of the Trail of Tears exhibit in Laughlin Park. A ceremony was held to officially open and dedicate this site to the memory of the Native Americans lost on this infamous trek. We are proud to be a stop on the National Historic Trail.

Another dedication this year was the completion and opening of the Roubidoux Park Stage, funded by the Dial family. The Park also saw the resurfacing of the Walking Trail, using grant funds. We continue to raise funds for the new Little Heroes Playground and hope to begin construction in 2016.



Several businesses opened in Waynesville during 2015, among them were the Waynesville Medical Plaza, Sinks Pharmacy, Burger King, and Flat Branch Home Loans. The revitalization of the downtown square continued with Nona's Kitchen and Lamb's Donuts joining the downtown neighborhood.

Other highlights are the partnership in animal care with St. Robert and Fort Leonard Wood, redrawing our City Ward boundaries to make elections more equal. We have installed 600 new automatic reading water meters in the Hunter's Point area and have begun the process in the City neighborhoods, installing 1000 automatic electric readers. We have begun a Master Plan for the Regional Airport, using grant funds. The City signed a letter of intent supporting a solar farm in the city limits. We have continued the work clearing trees from our utility right of ways, improving reliability.
