## NEW PARKING ORDINANCES

As we enter our snow season, the City Council has made some decisions to help with snow removal, as well as emergency access to some of our streets. This will affect the Woodland Hills area, but only Edna Street and Lyle Curtis. The duplexes there have cars parking on both sides of the streets. We could not get our plows down the street. The City is concerned that a fire truck or ambulance could not get access, if needed.

The City Council has passed an ordinance limiting parking to only one side of the street on Edna and Lyle Curtis in the duplex areas. It will be odd or even sides, depending on the street you live on. Signage will be coming up, shortly. Our police will not ticket people for a while, as you become used to this. Most all cities have parking on one side only in their residential areas. We have not noticed a huge problem with this until recently. The amount of tenants in this new area means a massive amount of cars parked on the streets and safety had to be addressed.

Please help us share this news with your neighbors. If you live on a cul-de-sac or one of our narrow roads, please don't park on the street during snow events. The Street Department cannot get our plows into these areas with cars on the street.
