MID TERM BUDGET ADJUSTMENTS

With changes in planning and revenues, the City Council voted to accept adjustments to the 2019 Budget. The original 2019 budget was \$20.1 million and now has been increased to \$23.4 million. Additions of grant projects and increased revenues in some areas allowed the Council to adjust plans to road paving and also, the addition of grant projects for the parks and the airport led to the increase.

The collection of the Internet Use Tax has been surprising. With a conservative budget estimate of \$40,000 for the year, the City has already collected \$80,000. This money is being added to our Roads and Grounds budget, as promised, and will allow more roads to be paved, as prioritized in our Capital Improvement Plan.



Sales tax has also been on the increase this year and all of these good signs for our local economy led to this increased adjustment to our fiscal budget.

REMEMBER THE REMOVAL VISITS WAYNESVILLE ON 35TH ANNIVERSARY

June saw the arrival of the Remember the Removal Riders to the Laughlin Park area for the 35th anniversary of their re-enactment of the infamous Trail of Tears. The Riders continue to remember the struggles of their ancestors. Waynesville has hosted the Riders since the certification of Laughlin Park as a site on the National Historic Trail in 2006.



State Representatives Steve Lynch and Rocky Miller and Mayor Hardman presented proclamations honoring their efforts to keep their history alive and the honoring of their ancestors. The trek began in Georgia and ended in Oklahoma. The grueling route covers 1000 miles.

- *updated the demolition and rebuilding of Water Well #2 well-house and moving it above the flood plain




CRIDER NAMED GOOD CITIZEN
